National studies have shown that patients with behavioral health issues die on average 25 years younger than the average population, with the majority of deaths caused by chronic illnesses such as diabetes and cardiovascular disease.

Through the AIMS program, Audrey Gressett received supportive psychotherapy to help with her depression while she also learned how to eat better, dropping her blood sugar to a manageable level. After her AIMS social worker learned she likes to swim, she received a swimsuit and passes to swim in the pool at the Baylor Institute for Rehabilitation that is located near her home.

"Swimming helps with my depression, it relaxes me," said Audrey. "I don't think about my problems when I'm swimming."
